The Peter Fleming Award is one of the senior awards of the Society awarded annually in support of research that advances geographical knowledge and understanding. Applications can be made in any field of geography provided the project can demonstrate genuine advancement of current knowledge.

The application deadline is **25 November 2011**.

Eligibility

- The main objective of the research must be to advance geographical knowledge
- Applicants must be UK nationals
- Applicants must hold a doctorate and have a proven research record
- Applicants should either be working within a UK Higher Education Institution or as an independent researcher within the UK
- The project may be field, lab or desk based, or any combination of these elements, and can focus on the UK, other parts of Europe, or overseas
- Individuals or groups can apply
- If funding is being sought for a component part of a larger project, the sub-project should be free-standing with its own objectives
- Equipment costs should not comprise more than 10% of the total
- Conference attendance will not be funded
- Institutional overheads will not be funded
- Salaries for research staff are not eligible for funding (but replacement costs for teaching assistance to free up research time of the principal investigator may be considered)

Application process

Applications should be submitted by email in word format to the Grants Officer at the Society. Deadlines will be strictly enforced.

Applications must contain the following information:

- Name, affiliation and full contact details (please include an email address)
- Title and short abstract (max 100 words)
- Aim of the project and objectives (max 250 words)
- A full description of the proposed research, including methodologies, field site (if relevant) and a timeline (max 1,000 words)
- Location of research area including the latitude and longitude (These are used by the RGS-IBG to geocode information about our grants programme in GIS)
- An assessment of the wider context and relevance of the research (max 500 words) and how it advances geographical knowledge
- An outline of plans for disseminating the results (max 250 words)
- A risk assessment and safety management plan, and details of appropriate ethical approvals (see conditions of award, max 300 words)
- A fully itemised budget. This should include travel, accommodation and per diem costs, as well as details of the source of funds for budgeted costs that exceed the value of the award
- One-page summary CV of the project Principal Investigator; an appended list of his or her publications, and details of all other researchers involved if appropriate (name, qualifications, expertise, nationality, role - max 200 words per member)
- Please do not send supporting documents such as previous reports, these will not be used when screening the applications.

Learning and Leading Fieldwork Apprenticeships

Additional funding of £2,000 may be made available if you are able to take a first year

geography undergraduate from your university into the field with you, to enable them to gain experience as a fieldwork apprentice. The Learning and Leading Fieldwork Apprenticeships aim to support those students who would not normally benefit from such opportunities. Please state whether you are interested in applying for an apprenticeship in the first section of your application. Your selected student will then be required to submit an application by **17 February 2012**. Referee statements

Two referee statements are required. Both referees should be independent of the research activities and institution.

Please send each of your referees a copy of the Referee Guidelines below and ask them to send the references directly to the Grants Officer by **25 November 2011**. References should be sent by email. Applications will be jeopardised if referee statements are not received on time.

Selection process

Applications will be assessed by an external panel of experts. From the proposals, up to four projects will be shortlisted and applicants should expect to be called for interview. Interviews will be held at the Royal Geographical Society (with IBG) in London. The assessors will consider how closely the application matches the criteria and the ability of the applicant to successfully complete it

Reporting and Conditions

- The RGS-IBG requires that the research it funds be conducted in an ethical and responsible manner. All RGS-IBG awards are conditional on your Institutions approval of the projects risk assessment and ethical considerations. Full details of the Society's ethical guidelines for research can be found at www.rgs.org/grants-ethics. **Please provide information on the status of approvals in your application**
- **Within a month** of completion of the fieldwork/data collection, you will be required to complete a short report. High resolution JPEG images which capture the essence of the project (the research problem, methods and findings) are also required.

- A full final report must be submitted electronically and in hard copy by **1 September** of the year following the award. The final report must include a 250 word abstract, a description of the project and its key findings (1000 words minimum), digital images that capture the spirit of the project and its results, a final budget, and details of presentations, publications and any other outputs
- Award details, including text and images from reporting, may be used in publications and on the Society website
- The award winner may be asked to present a lecture on the project work at the RGS-IBG at a mutually convenient date
- The Society's support should be acknowledged in all publications and outputs. Copies of any such publications and outputs should be submitted to the Society

Note: Digital photographs should be high resolution and in JPEG format.
