

Guide to accessing Society journal articles for Fellows and members using JSTOR

JSTOR, in association with the Society and our publisher Wiley-Blackwell, maintains all online holdings of Society journal articles older than five years.



There are three options for accessing articles through JSTOR:

1. Affiliation with a JSTOR participating library or organisation

The JSTOR collections are available at thousands of participating libraries and institutions (see lists of participants: [United States](#) and [International](#)), including the [Foyle Reading Room](#) at the RGS-IBG in London. If you are a student or an academic and usually have access through your university or institutional website but are trying to access JSTOR from an off-campus location, you may not be recognised as being affiliated with a participating site. Please visit your library's website to login to JSTOR, or contact a librarian to learn about options for remote access. If you have an Athens account you may immediately enter JSTOR via the [Athens Login](#) page.

2. Visit your local library

The journals in the JSTOR archive are available at many libraries. You may wish to check your library's print holdings for the article, or request the article through interlibrary loan. You may also be able to use JSTOR at a participating library that is open to the public. The license agreement with libraries allows for use of the collection by anyone present in the library, whether or not they are affiliated with that institution. Check the lists of [United States](#) and [International](#) institutions for a JSTOR participating library near you.

3. Purchase an article through JSTOR

Articles can be purchased through JSTOR by initially searching for the article using an internet search engine and then using the Publisher Sales Service option to complete the purchase. For full instructions, please read [Instructions for purchasing an article through JSTOR](#).
