

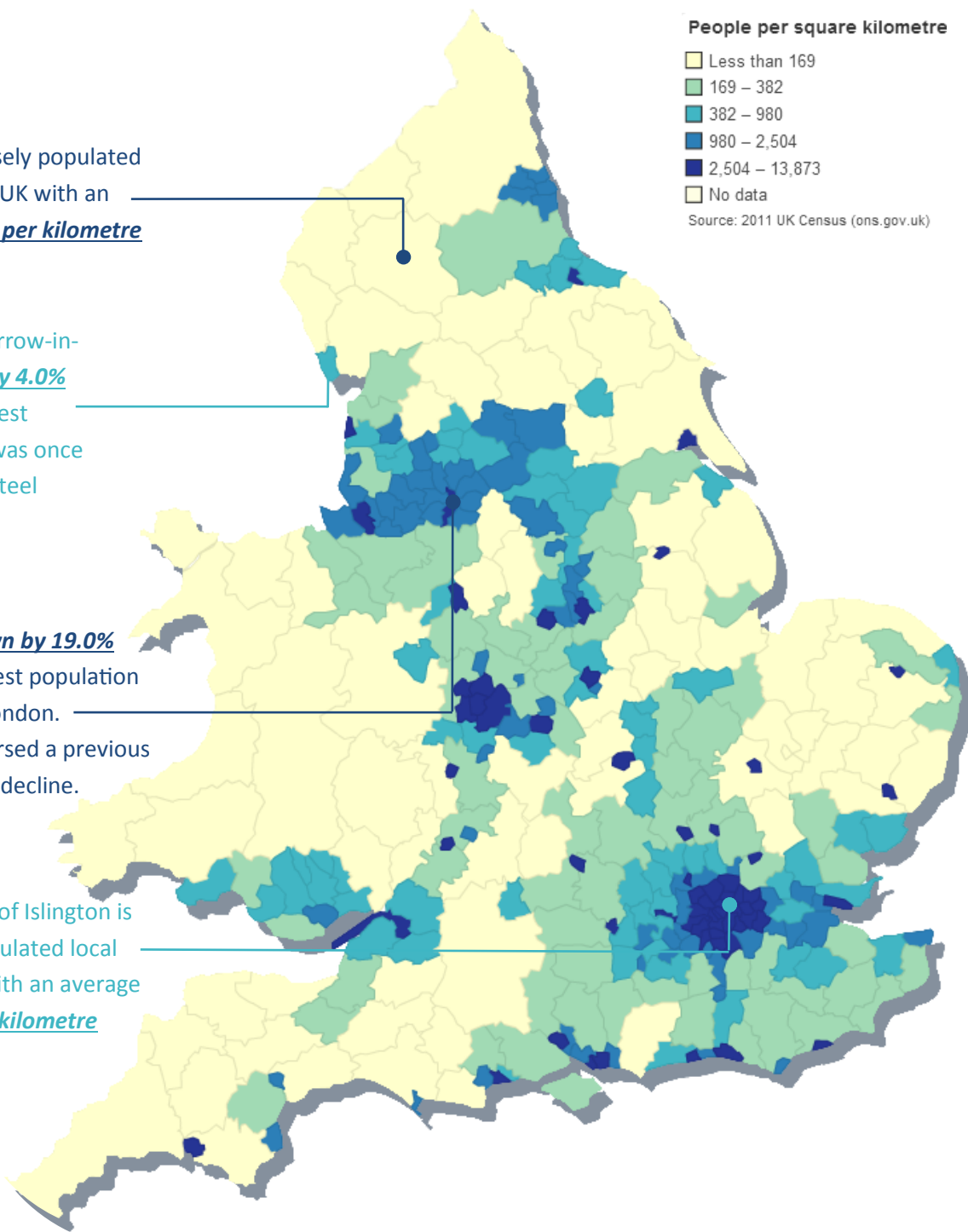
UK population distribution

Eden is the least densely populated local authority in the UK with an average of **25 people per kilometre**

The population of Barrow-in-Furness has **shrunk by 4.0%** since 2001, the greatest decline in the UK. It was once the largest iron and steel centre in the world

Manchester has **grown by 19.0%** since 2001, the greatest population increase outside of London. Immigration has reversed a previous record of population decline.

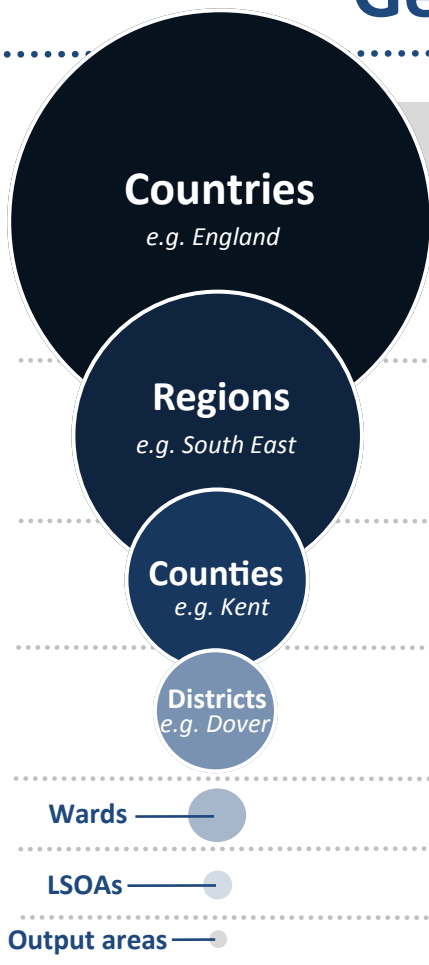
The London Borough of Islington is the most densely populated local authority in the UK with an average of **13,873 people per kilometre**

Geography of the UK



The UK census data is geographically located. This allows people to compare the characteristics of different areas. Data is available at a number of scales, from Countries down to 'Output Areas'. Here's how the scale works...

The UK has **four countries**: England, Wales, Scotland and Northern Ireland.

England currently has **nine regions**: North East, North West, Yorkshire and Humber, East Midlands, West Midlands, East of England, London, South East and South West.

The UK is divided into a total of **36 counties**, including but not limited to: Nottinghamshire, Essex, Pembrokeshire, Stirling, Derry and Greater London.

Counties are sub-divided into **districts, boroughs and local authorities**. This is the UK's lowest tier of local government.

Electoral wards have an average of around 6,000 residents. Used for voting.

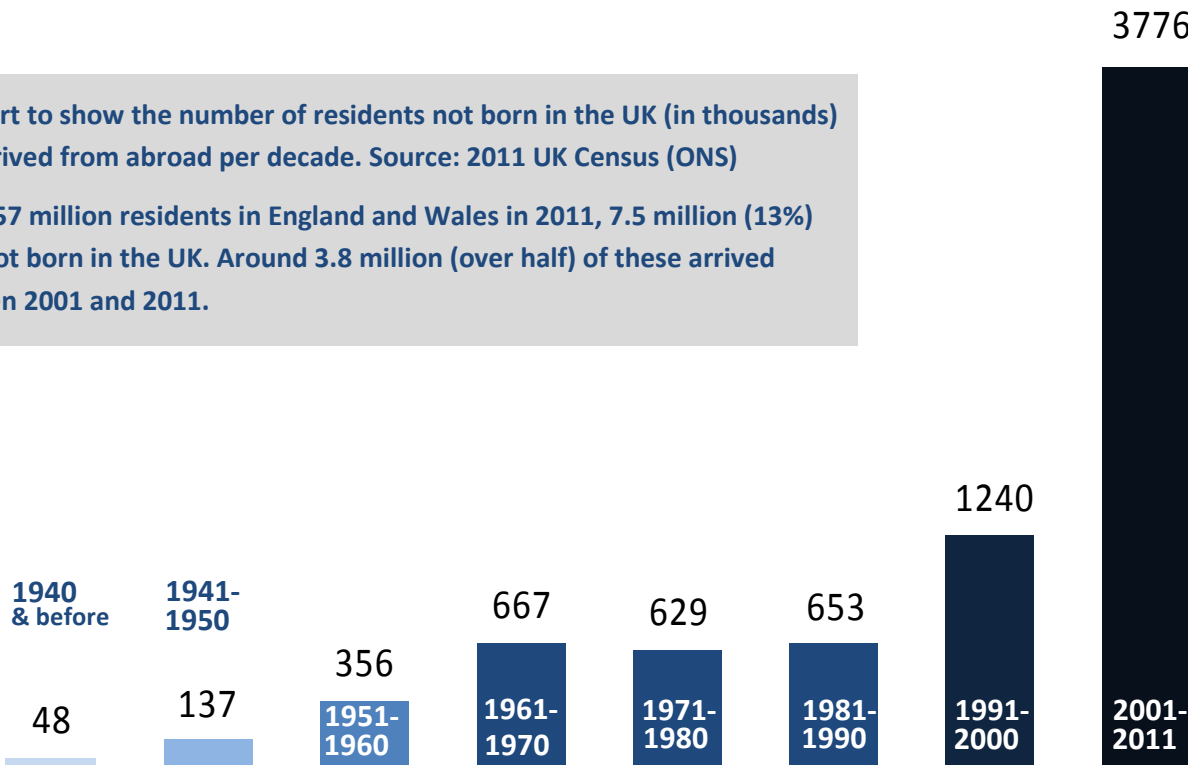
Lower Super Output Areas (LSOAs) have an average of around 1,500 residents.

Output Areas have an average of around 300 residents. This is the lowest level at which census data is available to ensure the anonymity of households.

Boom in immigration

Of the 57 million residents in England and Wales in 2011, 7.5 million (13%) were not born in the UK. Around 3.8 million (over half) of these arrived between 2001 and 2011.

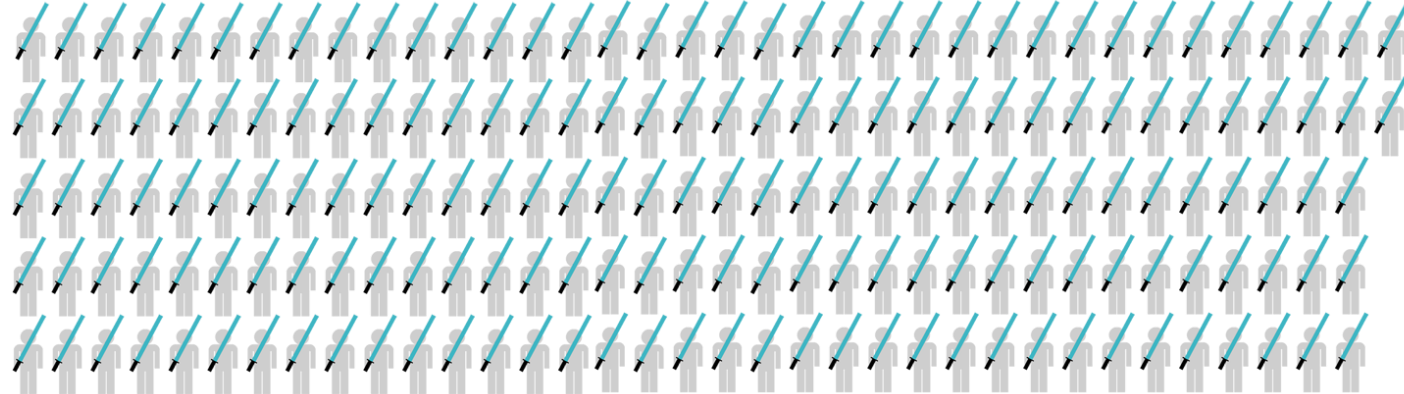
