The Date Palm has adapted to thrive in most of the Arabian Peninsula as well as other arid environments around the world. It is thought that wild Date Palm trees were growing in Oman over 6,000 years ago. Date Palms can grow up to 23 metres tall and can live up to 100 years. They are Keystone Species meaning that they help define a whole ecosystem – without them, the ecosystem would be hugely different or not exist at all.
